I have been very fortunate to become president in a year that surely ranks among the most successful in the long history of The Royal Canadian Geographical Society. In June 2017, we moved (temporarily) into our new home at 50 Sussex Drive, a stunning building in a stunning location on Rideau Falls, where the Rideau River joins the mighty Ottawa River. In short order that month we hosted several high profile events, including the Roald Amundsen event with the Norwegian Embassy, the launch of the Indigenous Peoples Atlas of Canada project, The Great Trail event and the openings of the incredible Alex Janvier exhibition Thirteen Moons and of the National Capital Commission's Plan for Canada's Capital, 2017–2067

Financially, the Society has never been on more solid ground. With the help of some major gifts by long-time friends of the Society and a strong custom publishing performance, we greatly exceeded budget and have been able to clean up the balance sheet after many years! Congratulations to John Geiger, Gilles Gagnier, Cathy Frame and the entire senior management team for their hard work and exceptional performance.

This year saw the Society award its Gold Medal to former Prime Minister John Turner and national treasure Gordon Lightfoot. And speaking of Canadian icons, we were very fortunate that pioneering Canadian astronaut Roberta Bondar agreed to serve as Honorary Vice-President, joining, among others, author and ethnobotanist Wade Davis and Inuit historian and explorer Louie Kamookak. We also went international, awarding a Gold Medal to Sir David Attenborough in London and the Burpee Medal to former U.S. President Jimmy Carter in Plains, Georgia.

Every year also brings change, and this year we said au revoir (but not goodbye) to CEO Emeritus André Préfontaine, who has now retired. The Society owes André a huge debt of gratitude for steering us through difficult times not so very long ago. As well, Élisabeth Nadeau stepped down from the Board as Vice-President, her second tour of duty on the Board. Thanks to Élisabeth for all her dedication and hard work.

The future truly looks bright for the Society. I look forward to continuing to work with Society staff and meeting as many of the close to 1,000 Fellows as I can in the coming year.


EXPEDITIONS

The RCGS' Expeditions Program received 31 applications this year, and the Expeditions Committee opted support the following five expeditions:

- Expedition of the Year was The Enduring Ice a goal of investigating the breakdown of the frozen ocean, Smith and his team set out just 800 kilometres from the North Pole, kayaking through the dynamic, ice-choked passageway separating Canada and Greenland, exploring and documenting the ice as they travelled.
- Diane Whelan's **500 Days in the Wild** was awarded the RCGS's Women's Expedition of the Year. Using only human-powered transportation, Whelan hiked, biked, paddled and snowshoed across 23,000 etres of the country's Great Trail
- The RCGS also supported Natalia Martinez's Women's Logan Traverse expedition, in which she ittempted a solo climb of Mount Logan. Martinez made it to an elevation of 3,700 feet before extreme and dangerous weather forced her to end her climb.





Canadian Geographic Enterprises just completed in our industry — and cost controls remained the best financial year in its almost 90-year history. Partner projects were the primary driver of this financial result, most notably the Indigenous Peoples Atlas of Canada (IPAC). The year included a number of other new and highprofile partnerships, including with CPAC (the Cable Public Affairs Channel) and the National Capital Commission. In addition, Canadian Geographic Education had a banner year,

circulation revenue was stable — a definite win

From an editorial standpoint, this past year has been very strong indeed. We are producing as much or more content than ever in print, online and thorough social media. The Canadian Geographic/The Walrus joint special interest publication is an innovative and creative model and has been very well received. Though still on newsstands all signs suggest it will be best

CANADIAN GEOGRAPHIC EDUCATION

Canadian Geographic Education continues to expand CONTESTS its reach across the nation, with membership now sitting at 20,000, having more than quadrupled its nbership in less than six years. It is truly amazing We have simultaneously been working on a business to see the dedication, support and growth that is plan, visual identity, website, business cards, etc., in driven by the Can Geo Education executive committee. Meetings with curriculum developers, ministry of education contacts and school board representatives continue to drive efforts to increase geographic education in Canada and are leading to a very promising future.

The Canadian Geographic Challenge capped off its 22nd year of competition with an out-of-this-world national final. CSA Astronaut David Saint-Jacques led the first completely bilingual National Final to a nailbiting end, with Ben Woodworth from London, Ont., taking home the grand prize. Our top five finalists were also awarded One Ocean Expeditions' Fins and Fiddles trip from July 21-31, which allowed them to expand their geographic knowledge while exploring some of Canada's most breathtaking scenery.

Canada's Coolest School Trip, meanwhile, saw a class of Grade 8 students from Lethbridge, Alta., travel to Nova Scotia in June after beating out 68 other classrooms with their exceptional video.

The sixth year of the Classroom Energy Diet Challenge was nominated for another national award, and saw huge success in student engagement across the country.

RESOURCES

In addition to the continuing development of Can Geo in the Classroom, 3M infographics and the IDRC workbooks, Can Geo Education continues to grow the Giant Floor Map and (printable) tiled map programs. As demand, variety and partnership increased over the 2016-17 fiscal year, so did the resource offerings from Can Geo Education.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

For the first time in several years, Canadian Geographic Education was able to run a summer institute for geography teachers at 50 Sussex. Through the generous support of the R. Howards Webster Foundation, 15 teachers from across the country travelled to Ottawa in July to explore best practices for incorporating fieldwork into classrooms. Participants will continue to develop and share resources with Can Geo Education members through professional development programs and learning activities online. These institutes will continue to strengthen geographic education in Canada for at least the next two years.





STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIPS

The Society continues to seek and enhance strategic partnerships with organizations that share its values and commitment to making Canada better known to Canadians and to the world.

To that end, the Society has currently established broad agreements with 25 key partners, including, among others, the RCGS's major travel partner,

One Ocean Expeditions, the Canadian Public Access Channel (CPAC), EF Educational Tours and the National Capital Commission. Furthermore, the Society is working to secure partnership agreements with an additional seven organizations, including CISCO, Massey College, Encounters with Canada




